The air picks up moisture, then slams into the rugged mountains of Japan's spine, which soar to heights of 2,000–3,000 meters. The result? Heavy snowfall as the air rapidly cools, releasing moisture as snow. Few places on Earth have warm coastal seas and towering mountain ranges packed so closely together. Japan's unique natural environment creates a true snow wonder.
